3.30 PM Round Table: Cultural Plurality and Urban Development

For some years now, the urbanization of our world has been highlighting important issues in the preservation, enhancement, and development of areas subject to massive, uniform transformation. This urban expansion is the obvious result of major migrations. How can we foster (or further) this cultural diversity as part of the urban renewal process? How important are sociocultural facilities and regional cultural development as factors of urban sociability? What role does heritage play in changing urban identities? How does heritage protection integrate environmental factors? Is "ecoresponsible" behavior not the product of an "energy culture" that has yet to be thrown into question? In the face of eco-fatigue, can culture provide the impetus for environmental renewal in urban areas? Should we not focus on reawakening our imaginations and sensibilities to promote viable urban development?
